Together we CALL

9-year-old Lola* had been in the hospital for a substantial amount of time before finding her new home at Norvent, a Together Trust residential home which specialises in supporting children with emotional and behavioural difficulties.

Lola had selective mutism, but the team found creative ways to bond with Lola and always celebrated 'wins', no matter how small.

"Being an established team from day one was so significant. We had to learn from each other. It was so open and reflective," Assistant Manager Mandy recalls.

"Little by little, she was becoming more chatty – and more cheeky! Seeing the subtle connections she was making was so rewarding."



Together we COCO

A few months into her new home, Lola was flourishing – but the next challenge was getting her back into education.

"She'd missed so much school. We were thinking, 'How are we going to manage this?'

"We arranged a tutor from Manchester Virtual Schools, and it was a perfect fit. We'd celebrate every achievement openly and genuinely. We all understood the importance of small wins and the bigger picture."

They worked with Virtual Schools so that Lola could take her SATS at home, and she did amazingly, despite all the time she'd missed from school, and they secured a place at a supportive secondary school for her.

"She started Year 7 last September.
Our team, the school, and Virtual
Schools all worked together, but we
were led by Lola the whole time. When
she'd say, 'I can't do a full day,' we
listened." How long Lola could stay at
school every day kept increasing, and
now, one year into school, she hasn't
missed a day yet!

"Going to school has given her a sense of purpose. She's starting Drama Group next year. She's just so funny, she needs to be on the stage! She's on the waiting list for St John's Ambulance because her dream is to become a paramedic."

Together we COMMON TO THE RESERVE T

We were delighted to open a brand new service this year to expand our ever-growing service offering.

Lyndene, a Home from Home environment based in Wythenshawe, was established through a collaborative effort involving Manchester City Council's social care team and NHS England. The new service works with young people with learning difficulties and autism and their families to develop systems and strategies aimed at keeping families together. The service also works in partnership with schools and multidisciplinary teams to facilitate improvements in school attendance and access to the education system for children.



Together we Lan

Lyndene creates a safe space where our expert team can help the young people we support to develop new skills, to take carefully planned risks and to develop their current interests further. Young people have the opportunity to come to Lyndene for planned short sessions or visits – either by themselves, or with family members.

Whilst many services support young people with autism and learning difficulties once a family breakdown has happened, Lyndene differs in that it aims to support families before

this point to strengthen bonds, keep families together in their home and give everyone a chance to thrive.

Having been operational for over a year now, we are already seeing young people benefiting from Lyndene; thriving through participating in the engaging activities organised by staff. One young person particularly enjoyed a scavenger hunt and quizzes about different countries, which helped strengthen the bond between them and their mother through shared experiences. Another young person has improved their baking skills,

mastering recipes for brownies and pizza in just two weeks. They take great joy in sharing his culinary creations with staff and family.

Late last year, we joined forces with fellow charity National Star to launch our nationwide survey 'What comes after education'; the findings of which are shared with the government and other organisations with the long-term ambition of improving the way that young people are supported into adulthood.

At the parliamentary launch of these findings, we spoke to Rebecca, whose autistic son Joshua graduated from Inscape House School last year. She has been a passionate advocate for people with SEND for years.



Together we achieve

Rebecca shared: "Even though my son has been awarded a 3-year college placement, the local authority has said it will only pay for the first year. After that, they will move him into a supported internship or into adult social care!

They have made that decision without considering what is in the best interest for my son, without talking to the college team who support him and without talking to me. They are not putting him at the heart of the decision making.

So now I must prepare for yet another fight. I can prove categorically how much he needs his education in order to support himself in the future. I am terrified what will happen next for my son when he leaves education. What is out there today isn't good and extremely hard to navigate.

Yet, with the right support, my son has such potential. Thanks to the specialist school and the college he attends, he now does two half-days of work experience each week at two different settings and is thriving. That has happened because the college listens

and the college understands. We continue to fight for our children to give them the best outcomes, because if we don't speak up for them, nobody else will!"

Sadly, these experiences are not uncommon. In our comprehensive report, our findings show that young people and their families up and down the country face challenges when transitioning into adulthood.

We're so proud of the progress the adults we support have made in the past year at Salford Hub, one of our community services, exploring new activites and strengthening their skills.

One of the gentlemen who attends Salford Hub has been flourishing at his local swimming pool. After years of struggling with public activities, he has been working with staff over the past two years to build his confidence and encourage him to go out into the community. And all the hard work is paying off!





Together we

Sameya, Senior Support Worker, shares more:

"We began with trips to the park and feeding the ducks and, slowly but surely, he's now regularly going for swims at three different pools. He's asking for more and more swimming trips! He's been twice this week and he's super happy.

Another individual loved playing the PlayStation at the hub so we worked towards going to a local game centre. He's now thriving at the game centre, where he's engaging in a new shared space. His growing confidence has

enabled him to initiate conversations with new people and ask them their names.

A big part of what we do at Salford Hub is teach people skills to navigate activities in communal settings; building skills in the safety of the hub which we can then generalise more widely. It's about risk enablement and taking positive risks. The individuals can then build new routines that enrich their daily lives, allowing them to participate in activities they love.

We recently held a summer BBQ where all the people supported came outside and ate together for the first time, which was a huge moment."

There's lots you can do with a spare room in your house, from a home gym to a walk-in wardrobe. But nothing is more rewarding than turning a spare room into a home for a foster child.

Across the UK, 7,000 new fostering homes are needed to care for children who are unable to live with their own family.

Two people who have answered this call for care are Jill and Mark, who have used their spare room to provide a loving home to many children across their years of fostering.

Fostering spotlight

Jill explained the difference becoming a foster carer has made to her life:

"The impact of fostering on my life is that it has completely taken over it, we live with these children every day, it's the first thing we think about.

Being a foster carer has really changed my life. To see these young people who haven't had the experiences as others their age, to be able to provide those experiences for them and let them thrive in life... it just means everything to me."

Mark added: "Seeing the children leave and get good careers, you give yourself a tap on the back to say you've done a good job." Whilst there are many options when choosing who to foster with, Jill and Mark chose the Together Trust to benefit from the supportive, local fostering team and the extensive training available.

Jill said:

The Together Trust will give you the opportunity to go and speak to other foster carers, to find out their real-life experiences. They also outlined all the training that was available as well as explaining what was expected of us and the challenges we might face. They provide wonderful support.

From Mark:

The Together Trust has been a fantastic agency for us, the support mechanism, the training; everything has been superb. And we decided to go ahead with fostering after some initial training and, 21 years later, we are still doing it and still enjoying it!



Our volunteers

Our wonderful volunteers have continued to support services and people across the Together Trust. In addition to the time contributed by our trustees and governors, they donated 3,310 hours to our services and 551 hours to our events.
